Past & Present Learn about people around them and their roles in society.

Physical Development

Communication and Language

Listening activities, in large and small groups Talk about who we are, why we are special, who is part of our family Have the confidence to speak to group and answer questions. Initiate conversation—at snack time or when playing alongside others. Listen to others. Express own ideas and preferences. Re-tell and sequence a story. Small world play, dress up dolls and role play box. Puppers to retell stories and express feelings. To respond to a variety of role play situations act out stories increasing vocabulary and learning to express themselves clearly Ask and answer questions about stories. Join in with stories and rhymes.

Computing

Mathematical Development

Acorns Develop fast recognition of up to 3 objects, without having to count them individually (subitising). Recite numbers past 5. Say one number for each item in order: 1,2,3,4,5. Counting children at register time. Know that the last number reached when counting a small set of objects tells you how many there are in total. Show 'finger numbers' up to 5. Experiment with their own symbols and marks as well as numerals. Oak

Matching numbers. Sorting numbers to 5. Comparing numbers to 5. Composition of numbers. Spatial Awareness
