#### Uniform

Please ensure all uniform including wellies/shoes/PE kits are labelled with your child's name. School cannot be responsible for unnamed items.

Please remember our school uniform policy is all black shoes or all black trainers NOT Nike, Vans, sandals or any other high fashion footwear. But where a child has worn them out or out grown them we completely understand that replacements will appear as soon as possible.

## Reading

It is essential you try and read with your child every day and record in their book if you have please. In some cases parents are not support their child with this and it impacts on their learning and progress. Please help us with your child's learning by hearing them read at least **3 TIMES PER WEEK**, thank you.

## Tips for reading with children of any age:

- Set aside some time
- Find somewhere quiet without any distractions turn off the TV/radio/computer.
- Ask your child to choose a book
- Sharing books they have chosen shows you care what they think and that their opinion matters. This means they are more likely to engage with the book.
- Sit close together
- Encourage your child to hold the book themselves and/or turn the pages.
- Point to the pictures
- If there are illustrations, relate them to something your child knows. Ask them to describe
  the characters or situation or what will happen next. Encourage them to tell you the story
  by looking at the pictures.
- Encourage your child to talk about the book
- Talking about the characters and their dilemmas helps children understand relationships and is an excellent way for you to get to know each other or discuss difficult issues. Give your child plenty of time to respond. Ask them what will happen next, how a character might be feeling or how the book makes them feel.
- And lastly, above all make it fun!

It doesn't matter how you read with a child, as long as you both enjoy the time together.

Don't be afraid to use funny voices - children love this! It's never too early to start reading with your baby too.

## FREE SCHOOL MEALS (PUPIL PREMIUM)

Some parents/carers whose income is below £16,190 per family are entitled to Free School Meals (OFSTED call this pupil premium). The school currently receives additional funding per pupil in our budget to use to support these pupils across the school. We use it to benefit every child by supporting us to have extra staff for small group work, buy resources to support small group work and interventions. A small proportion of this funding is used to subsidise Breakfast and Afterschool clubs and support half the cost of residential and school visits.

#### **Punctuality**

Pupils are recorded as being late for school if they arrive after the doors have closed and come in through the main school doors. Children who arrive after 9am receive an unauthorised mark.

All Doors will be locked once classes are inside and the main entrance will have to be used.

All late marks show on children's attendance registers and we will be routinely contacting parents whose children are regularly late. Our routines start the minute children arrive at school with children getting straight on with their independent work in class. Children arriving late miss out on vital learning time and find it harder to settle into the school day and some pupils get upset when they are constantly late. Please help us by ensuring your child is at school, ready to come in when the bell rings at 8.50am. We'll keep you posted on how we are doing in our assemblies and newsletters.

#### **Attendance**

NEW INFORMATION – PLEASE NOTE THE INCREASE TO 94% attendance for any child taken out of school for a holiday in term time. This is the minimum they must have if parents do not want to be issued a penalty notice unless there are exceptional circumstances.

All schools in the Coquet Partnership have agreed that if an unauthorised leave of absence is taken during term time and the pupil's attendance in the 12 month period leading up to the absence is less than 94%, an application to the Local Authority for a penalty notice may be made based on the circumstances. **Our overall NEW whole school attendance target is 97%**.

#### **Ofsted Attendance**

To aim to an outstanding school Ofsted say- 'Pupils value their education and rarely miss a day at school. No groups of pupils are disadvantaged by low attendance. The attendance of pupils who have previously had exceptionally high rates of absence is rising quickly towards the national average'.

#### **Topic Reviews**

Acorns class topic review – Autumn term 1 – Myself and my family/Harvest time

The children have settled really well into Nursery and are learning the boundaries and routines well. They are all forming some lovely friendships which is very nice to see. Here are some of the fun activities that we have done this half term;

- Self-portraits We looked at ourselves in the mirror and identified the colour of our eyes and hair and then painted ourselves. These are now displayed in the unit for everyone to see.
- Looking at photos of our family and drawing who is in our family. These are looking great in our home-corner area and leads to lots of conversations about our families.
- Talking about how to be a good friend we made some magic friendship potions.
- We have enjoyed learning all about Autumn and made some Autumn trees with our hands and fingers. We enjoyed learning all about Harvest time and taking part in the Harvest festival.

### Oak Class -topic review- Autumn 1- Myself and my family/Harvest time

What tired children we had at the end of the half term. They have all worked extremely hard full time in school. They have all started our Read Write Inc Phonics scheme and Mrs Timmins and Miss Darlow will be holding a meeting with parents very soon this term to share Reading and phonics information.

We have talked about our families and learnt about being a good friend.

Fiona from Little Movers has help with PE and coordination.

We loved performing our harvest songs for all our families .

Miss Adams has got to know the class and will be teaching us this half term.

## KS1 Elm and Beech Classes Summary – Fantastic Farming

What a wonderful term it has been in KS1, the children seem to have thoroughly enjoyed their farming topic with both classes developing a deeper understanding of how farming has changed over time, the benefit developments in machinery have had on the industry and how we can have a greater appreciation now for our Harvest understanding where it comes from.

Following our great visit to Low Steads farm the children were much more confident naming things you would find o a farm and what each things purpose was. They have a greater awareness of where our food comes from and how some can be natural and others man made form natural produce often originating from a farm.

In Literacy they started by looking at a simple story of the Lion in the Meadow which challenged their understanding of animals and where their setting could be. They then imitated, innovated and then invented their own version of the little red hen knowing about how bread is made. Meanwhile after making soup in class they learnt the features of instructions and have written their own for other commands such as growing cress heads of making a pizza. This was concluded brilliantly with Elm classes Warburtons workshop, knowing the ingredients for a healthy sandwich – Beech will be getting their chance in December too!

In other aspects of their learning, the children have become more confident in their place value and both addition and subtraction of numbers, they are starting to become speedier at logging on to their chromebooks to access online learning and have been using Art Hub for kids to develop their Artistic techniques when they are not doing Yoga with Debbie. It has been an action packed term and we are already super exited to start the next term with them!

#### **Chestnut Class** topic review – autumn term 1 – The Stone Age

We began the term engaging fully with our historical topic of the Stone Age. The children got themselves into tribes and immersed themselves in the prehistoric lifestyle learning about the different tools that were used and what they were used for drawing and sketching these into their art books. They got creative making their very own cave paintings using their hand prints. We used a large time line to help us think about time as linear and the different periods of time to see where and when the prehistoric Stone Age period was.















In science we observed and studied a variety of rocks making detailed drawings and describing their properties. We learnt about the process of fossilisation through an investigation using shells and sand as the sediment. As part of our Forest school adventures we became hunter gathers making spears and gathering foods around the fire pit. We also took on the role of historians and palaeontologists making rubbings of a variety of things as a way of recording what we found. In music the children have begun to learn the ukulele singing a variety of songs and learning the chords.

To finish our terms topic we had a visit from a Stone Age lady who brought with her many tools and objects for us to handle and discuss, including a popular rug made from a cow. As part of the day we got dressed in traditional costume and made our very own pre-historic clay pot using bones, stones and shells to help shape and make patterns with.

Willow Class Topic review: Savage Stone Age – Autumn 1

What a brilliant start to the year we have had in Willow Class, from day one it has been action packed when learning about the Savage Stone Age. We thoroughly loved the Literacy texts Stone Age Boy and Ug, creating great drama, wonderful descriptive writing and forming a solid foundation for our topic learning. Our most exciting day has to be when we had a Stone Age visitor and got to create our own Stone Age pots, as well as handling Stone Age artefacts. Additionally this term, the children have started their Ukulele lessons; we can now hold a Ukulele, play two chords and sing along with our tutor. We also looked at Spain for European Day of Languages; we learnt some basic phrases in Spanish, read Goldilocks and the Three Bears in Spanish, found out about their customs, learnt some facts and dance moves as well as sampling some yummy Spanish food.

## **Stars out of School**

News about Amelia in Chestnut Class:

"Amelia in competed in the South East Northumberland Dance Festival during the holidays, she received a Trophy for the highest marks in classical dance. The adjudicator also chose her favourite 12 dances from hundreds of dances during the festival and Amelia was chosen as one of these, all 12 danced again & Amelia came runner up and was given a bursary towards her dance fees. She also came away with 8 golds, 4 silver and 3 bronze medals.

She also starts her new dance school in Scotland on Sunday where she will be dancing with children who are 10+ in age."

What a fantastic achievement and Grange View is so proud of her dancing talents.

## Safe to Learn section

This is a section on our newsletter where we will share and update any safeguarding information for all parents/carers to be aware of. Mrs Pat Treanor is our Chair of governors and Safeguarding governor, Mrs Laskey and Mrs Chapman are our Designated Safeguarding lead staff.

## **OPERATION ENCOMPASS INFORMATION**

The original initiative was aimed at supporting children who are affected by domestic abuse. The next part of the project will help all children to learn about friendships, relationships, emotions and rules so that they can live and work together safely. Our Safeguarding liaison officer Karen Kirkbride will be in school this term delivering these workshops.

<u>Operation Endeavour</u>- This is an innovative project in which schools and colleges in Northumberland are participating, and which is run in partnership with Northumberland County Council and Northumbria Police. Operation Endeavour which commences in November 2018, aims to support children and young people who go missing from home. Children who go missing from home are at risk of significant harm and they may be vulnerable to sexual exploitation, violent crime, gang exploitation, or to drug and alcohol misuse. As a result, following any report of a child going missing to the Police, the Police will make contact with Children's Social Care who will then communicate relevant and necessary information to nominated school staff.

Each school has members of staff (key adults) who have been fully trained in liaising with the Police and Children's Social Care when required, and will ensure that the necessary support is made available to the child or young person following their return.

I believe that this project demonstrates our school's commitment to working in partnership to safeguard and protect children, and to providing the best possible care and support for our pupils.
