This prominent music venue is an iconic building designed by the British architect Norman Foster, and opened in 2004

This contemporary art gallery is housed in a converted flour mill and designed by Ellis Williams Architects in 2002. It was originally built in 1930s and used by Rank Hovis.

This is one of the last Tudor buildings in the Newcastle area owned by English Heritage. The two houses were built in the 1500s for merchants.
