**Crime and Punishment** The Victorians invented the first Police Officers and had some brutal punishments for crimes.

## **Useful words**

Bobbie - Victorian slang for a Police Officer (after Sir Robert [Bobby] Peel who founded the Police Force.

**Cane** – made from bamboo, rattan or birch. Teachers used this to punish children.

**Empire** – a group of countries ruled over by a single monarch.

**Industrial Revolution** – When machine manufacture became popular.

**Mangle** – a machine with two rollers that squeezed water out of clothes.

**Prison** – the main form of punishment in Victorian times.

**Queen Victoria** – the reigning monarch from 1837-1901

**Reign** – to rule as monarch

**Trial** – the act of hearing a case in court to decide whether or not a person has broken a particular law.

Workhouse – a large building where poor people who had no job or home lived.
